From the Desk of the Secretary General

This week, in a guest contribution, Natalia Cardona, Advocacy Coordinator, Social Watch discusses development and gender goals.

All development goals are gender goals

Thirty one years ago, many of the governments of the world committed legally to women's rights by signing the Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW). Sixteen years later the Beijing World Conference on Women adopted a comprehensive plan of action towards gender equality. And this September, the presidents and prime ministers of the world will meet in New York at the Millennium Development Goal summit to assess a decade of anti-poverty efforts. They will discuss how to progress in spite of the tremendous challenge coming from multiple and overlapping crises on climate, food, energy, finances and the economy. The challenge is tremendous and it will take the combined efforts of men and women to take the next step towards eradication of poverty for both men and women.

In spite of some progress, the follow-up of Beijing conference and CEDAW commitments are not yet complete. Gender equity is not yet fully implemented nor is it an equal component of sustainable economic and social development. By any measure, including Social Watch's Gender Equity Index, all is quiet where advances are most needed in gender equality. Social Watch members share a concern that governments are quick to sign on to international instruments but short on implementation. There is also a gap in gender legislation and its actual implementation. With the present global recession there is also a need to take stock of the progress made towards Internationally Agreed Development Goals including the MDGs and emerging issues.

CIVICUS condemns murder of Floribert Chebeya Bahizire, Executive Director of Voix des Sans Voix (VSV)

CIVICUS deeply condemns the assassination of Floribert Chebeya Bahizire, Executive Director of Voix des Sans Voix (VSV) in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). Mr Bahizire was found dead on 2 June after he was summoned by the General Inspectorate of Police. Voix des Sans Voix has expressed concern that Floribert Chebeya Bahizire may have been targeted in relation to his efforts to improve prison conditions. CIVICUS urges the Congolese Government to carry out an impartial and thorough investigation into the circumstances of his death and to ensure protection for human rights defenders working in the DRC.

The Elders support EHHR call for freedom from poverty

Speaking in a series of exclusive interviews released as part of the EHHR campaign, the members have called for stronger commitments and determined action to uphold the rights of children, women and all citizens to be free from poverty. The Elders' call comes ahead of the UN General Assembly's Informal Interactive Hearings with NGOs and the private sector next week (New York, 14-15 June 2010), the findings of which will provide input into the 'MDG summit' on 20-22 September 2010.

Outliers: The Story of Success

By: Malcolm Gladwell

In Outliers, the author examines the factors that contribute to high levels of success. To support his thesis, he examines the causes of why the majority of Canadian ice hockey players are born in the first few months of the calendar year, how Microsoft cofounder Bill Gates achieved his extreme wealth, and how two people with exceptional intelligence, Christopher Langan and J. Robert Oppenheimer, end up with such vastly different fortunes. Throughout the publication, Gladwell repeatedly mentions the "10,000-Hour Rule", claiming that the key to success in any field is, to a large extent, a matter of practising a specific task for a total of around 10,000 hours.

UN gets set for World Cup kick-off and renewed push on anti-poverty targets Source: UN News

With community festivals, television shows, posters, electronic games, multimedia campaigns and even a new song, the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) will be under the spotlight during the month-long World Cup.

A United Nations-backed radio station run by and for people living in remote parts of Bangladesh has a new programme that aims to assist farmers and fishers whose livelihoods are regularly upset by cyclones. Villagers will broadcast vital information to support those working in the agriculture, fisheries and livestock sectors through a community radio show set up jointly by the UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) and the Bangladeshi Ministry of Agriculture.

"We will be self-sufficient," said Gebremichael Giday, chairman of Abreha we Atsebeha, a village high in the arid uplands of northern Ethiopia, about 45km from Mekele, capital of the Tigray region. He is confident that in another 10 years they will not need food aid. The village, named after a rock-hewn medieval church perched on one of the mountains that surround it, lost 60 people in the famine of 1984. Then a food-for-work programme was set up to help rehabilitate the eroded land.

Moscow: A Dangerous Place to Defend Human Rights

The death of Eduard Chuvashov, a judge killed in cold blood on 12 April in Moscow, is another in a long and growing list of murders perpetrated on those in Russia who try to seek justice for the victims of crimes — an essential task for the country's future development. Within the Russian judiciary, Chuvashov was one of the rare judges with the courage to rule against powerful local government officials as well as high-ranking officers of the Interior Ministry. Indeed, he dared to send a number of them to prison. Recently, Chuvashov defied personal threats made against him and sentenced members of a particularly nasty Moscow-based neo-Nazi group to prison.
